Birds of Oak Hammock

It is awesome to watch the birds And to joyfully hear them sing It is a fascinating show And it doesn't cost us a thing

In their glossy black finery
The raucous Crows will strut around
Looking for all those tasty worms
And beetles they find in the ground

As a squadron they will pursue A terrified Red shouldered hawk While he attempts to shake them off He will cry out a frantic squawk

It is a rare treat when one spots A Barred owl who is hard to view Until you suddenly hear that Signature call "who cooks for you"

Coincidence about the pond There was a Little blue heron A Great egret and two Wood storks On a dead tree which was barren

Northern Parula and other Small birds are difficult to see They have unique signature calls But remain hidden in the tree

A small brown chatterbox is the Bountiful Carolina wren Always flitting around the brush Like an extremely nervous hen

Some other loud vocalists are Cardinal, Blue jay, Brown thrasher The Pileated woodpecker And the Great crested flycatcher

I was truly amazed to see A turkey run across the lawn To accost a Red shouldered hawk Foraging shortly after dawn

Large flocks of squealing Whistling ducks Sail overhead before daylight And a few visit the pond where They make a most picturesque sight Occasionally I will see Large migrating flocks passing through Like Robins and Cedar waxwings And isolated migrants too

The Great blue heron, White ibis And Kingfisher visit the pond Along with Hooded mergansers They depart for the great beyond

A wake of vultures found a dead Armadillo on which to feed Jostling for a tasty morsel It was a macabre sight indeed

Swallow-tailed kites are graceful birds With intricate flight maneuvers Performing quick turns loops and rolls To the delight of bird viewers

Most impressive are the formations Of Sandhill cranes flying overhead With their loud rattling bugle calls While displaying that red capped head

Watch for the White-eyed vireo Summer tanager, Mocking bird Mourning dove, Mississippi kite Tufted titmouse and Hummingbird

To identify birds like the The Carolina chickadee Download the free ingenious Cornell app "Merlin bird ID"

These wild birds are not concerned with Taxes, laws or regulations I so admire these free spirits Who fly without reservations

In addition to their music Some birds paint flashes of color Throughout the Oak Hammock landscape Some are bright but most are duller
